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
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About Taiwan Docs

The Bad Man

LEE Yong-chao / 76min / 2020

#War, Youth, Myanmar

The Bad Man is a documentary of the life story of a violent and bloodthirsty young man from Kachin, Myanmar, who casually discusses killing as if it were not his own story. His past of a non-voluntary, military life has cost him a great deal and completely changed his post-military life. With all the wounds and experiences, he is now considering which path to take for the future.



DIRECTOR & PRODUCER LEE Yong-chao

LEE was born in Myanmar, and now works both in Taiwan and Myanmar. His short films have been nominated at Busan International Film Festival and Warsaw Film Festival. His first documentary feature, *Blood Amber*, was selected at Locarno Film Festival for the Semaine de la critique competition section.

KAO Jun-honn / 90 min / 2020

Indigenous People, History, Colonization

In the Dabao River basin, where the Llyong Topa indigenous community used to be, stands a “ghost temple” where hundreds of Atayal people were buried. They fell victims to Japanese government’s first wave of indigenous genocide during its colonial rule of Taiwan. The massacre occurred much earlier than the Wushe Incident (1930), yet it is still rarely known to the world. The filmmaker visited the mountains over a hundred times, seeking clues to fill in the blanks of history.



DIRECTOR KAO Jun-honn

KAO was born in 1973 in Taiwan. He graduated from the Taipei National University of the Arts (TNUA) with a BA degree in Fine Arts in 1998, and earned his PhD degree in Art Creation and Theory from the Tainan National University of the Arts (TNNUA) in 2017. His artistic works mainly focus on issues of history, space, bio-politics, neoliberalism, East Asia, and indigeneity through the forms of physical practice, video art, planned action, and writing. He is currently an adjunct assistant professor at the TNUA.

TSENG Wen-chen / 87min / 2020

#Vietnam, Gender, Migrant Workers

Why do they run away? To make more money or to pursue better job opportunities? Through the accounts of the two “runaway” migrant workers, the film shows the highs and lows of their lives by telling their stories. They give up their legal status as migrant workers and take risks to work illegally. By spending their youth in Taiwan, they try to give their family a better life and change their fate.

DIRECTOR & PRODUCER TSENG Wen-chen

TSENG was born in Taipei in 1968. She obtained an MA from the Graduate Institute of Sound and Image Studies in Documentary at Tainan National University of the Arts. Her film, *Spring: The Story of Hsu Chin-Yu* (2002), won the Best Documentary at the Golden Horse Awards and was selected for the Busan International Film Festival.

The Way Home

Elaine WEI / 78 min / 2020

Aboriginal, Female, Family

Dremedrema is the chief heir of her tribe. Being the eldest, she therefore, must accept her inheritance of the position and status according to the tradition. Though her mother and children hope that she would disavow the obligation. Even Dremedrema had run away from her tribe once, her ancestral spirits has never given up on her. She is a tribal chief who doesn't speak the native tongue. At the same time she is a devoted single mother of three. She is a chief without her traditional tribal family house, unable to live within the tribe. She misses home. But despite ten years' effort, it is a home that she cannot easily return to.

DIRECTOR Elaine WEI

Elaine has worked in documentary production for thirteen years. The documentary series *Man and Trees* that she produced was nominated at the 2019 Golden Bell Awards. She has produced several documentaries about Taiwan's indigenous people, which include *The Angry Blazing Sun* and *Ancient Oceanic Explorer*.

PRODUCER HSU Kuo-yang

Before entering documentary filmmaking, HSU was a traveler and a journalist. He devoted himself to researching the issues about traditional culture and natural ecology. In recent years, he is interested in how Taiwan's indigenous culture has been affected by the wave of modernization.

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
**DIRECTOR & PRODUCER****LIN Yu-en**

WU is an illustrator, film director, and cartoonist. He has been concerned about local culture, history and family relations, and has produced animation content for documentaries and children's animation series. WU founded Weeler studio in 2015. The studio aims to promote Taiwan's aesthetic education and produces short documentaries about education in Taiwan.

**PRODUCER****LIN Yun-an**

LIN focuses on the promotion of cross-disciplinary aesthetic education in Taiwan. She has been working with school teachers for a long time to develop over 300 creative curricula. She also collaborated with production companies on a number of documentaries, exploring the learning status of students and achievements of teachers in the teaching field.



Green Jail

HUANG Yin-yu / 101 min / 2021

Memory, Family, Female, Human Rights

Grandma Hashima, the last existent from colonial Taiwan, who knows the secrets of “Green Jail”, the notorious coal mine before World War II in Okinawa, Japan. With hardly any visitors, she lives alone in an old and shaggy wooden house by the “jail on the sea” where her family once lived, she recounts her experience of the coal mine days on the island. Through her memories of guilt, pain, anger, and the miseries of the past 80 years, this film portrays the last years of Grandma Hashima’s life.



DIRECTOR & PRODUCER HUANG Yin-yu

HUANG was born in Taitung, Taiwan, and began documentary filmmaking in 2010 and since then has completed several short-form documentaries. He founded Moolin Films, Ltd. (Taiwan) in 2015, later Moolin Production Co., Ltd. (Japan) in 2019. Based in both Okinawa and Taipei, he produces documentaries and participates in international film projects. His first feature film, *After Spring, the Tamaki Family...* (2016), was theatrical released in Taiwan and Japan, and received a lot of international attention. He has been selected to the programme Emerging Producers 2020 of Ji.hlava as Taiwanese representative. Besides director and producer, he works as a programmer of Cinema at Sea- Ishigaki Island International Film Festival in Okinawa.

“K’s room” is a mental space that serves as a metaphor for the complex relationship between men, boundaries, and the nation during martial law. All the lines in the film were extracted from the sentences used in the “New English Grammar”, one of Taiwan’s most popular English grammar books, to restructure the mental status of its author, Mr. K, during his incarceration because of the political left.



DIRECTOR & PRODUCER HUNG Wei-lin

HUNG is an independent video artist graduated from ESEC, France (École supérieure d’études cinématographiques). Once worked as a TV screenplay writer, a TV program manager, and a film marketing specialist, now she focuses on film innovations and screenplay writings, attempting to make voices of the histories hidden and of the memories forgotten throughout time.

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A Lean Soul

CHU Hsien-che / 104 min / 2020

Literature, Biography

A Lean Soul examines the life and works of Taiwanese novelist Qi Dengsheng. The filmmakers were able to obtain in-depth interviews not only with Qi's closest friends and relatives, but also with the notoriously camera-shy Qi himself. The film also vividly dramatizes many passages from Qi's intensely autobiographical works of fiction. The result is an intimate and candid portrait of one of the most important and controversial Taiwanese writers of the last fifty years.

DIRECTOR CHU Hsien-che

CHU has worked as a director and writer for more than twenty years. In 2001, his film *Pick of the Litter: Stray Dogs* earned the Best Documentary at the Golden Horse Awards. His feature film, *White Ant*, was awarded the FIPRESCI Prize at the 2016 Busan International Film Festival.

PRODUCER LAI Meng-hsiu

LAI has worked with director CHU Hsien-che for a long time and worked as a producer of several documentary films such as *Prisoner*, *West Island*, *Taichung Railroad Station*, *An Exposure of Affected Hospital*, and as an executive producer of the feature film *White Ant*.

LEE Li-shao / 83 min / 2021

Education, Art

Dance educator LIN Ssu-tuan is the first professional nude model in Taiwan in the 1950s and the 1960s, the muse for painters and sculptors in the art world, and the face for photographers' salons around the world; in the end, she reversed the dynamics of the subject vs. the object and went on to perform her first solo modern dance in 1975, turning herself from the state of passiveness to an active educator of the art of dance.

LIN is over 80 years old, but she still fervently pursues her ideals and passions with her body; her path of life is indeed a book of female art history that communicates with the society in Taiwan.




DIRECTOR LEE Li-shao

LEE has been making documentaries and short films since 1999 and has more than 20 credits. His works often focus on the issues of history and different groups. In recent years, his productions are mainly about the isolated fighting Chinese army. He completed the Trilogy of Burmese Guerrillas in 2016 and took a look at their national identities and history. Episode one, *Boundary Revelation*, won the TIDF Jury Prize and was nominated for Golden Horse Awards, Golden Bell Awards, and film festivals around the world. In 2019, he completed *Song of Sakura Funeral* to see the aftermath of battles in Myanmar.

WANG Wan-jo / 135 min / 2020

#Manga, Art, Animation

Chen Uen is the most celebrated artist in the field of comic art in Asia. His work presented a unique aesthetic style that blends art forms of Chinese ink painting and western painting skills. His agility and skillfulness in using various materials have made him unparalleled, which is regarded as "Chen Uen aesthetic".

This film focuses on Chen Uen's art career, depicting Chen's aesthetics of life through representing his works and interviewing related persons. Centered on Chen Uen and his artworks, this film gives a brief overview of comic industries in greater China and Japan, trying to explore and carry forth Chen's legacy.



DIRECTOR WANG Wan-jo

WANG Wan-jo holds an MA in Screenwriting at Exeter University. She was an important production team member of the literary documentary series, *The Inspired Island*. Her first feature-length documentary, *River Without Banks* (2012), depicts a full picture of the prominent Taiwanese poet LO Fu. In 2017, her second work, *A Foley Artist*, was theatrically released in Taiwan and Hong Kong.



PRODUCER SHENG Ru-uing

SHEN holds a master degree in film production from the Taipei National University of the Arts. She has been a producer of PTS and the Moving Visual Co., and she is also very experienced in documentary and feature production. Now she is a producer of CNEX Studio Corporation.



PRODUCER Cate YU


Cate YU has been involved in documentary production for over 6 years. *A Foley Artist* and the literary documentary series *The Inspired Island* are her works as a producer.

After more than a decade in the financial industry, Jeff HUANG decided to leave his comfort zone at the age of 33 and changed his job from an analyst to a mixed martial artist without a regular income. Jeff walked away from it all, moved to Brazil to train. Upon his return to Taiwan, Jeff entered the professional world of MMA and became known as "The Machine".

But In the face of his family's doubts and marriage crisis, will he be able to continue to follow the path he has chosen?

An Indonesian director based in Taipei. His hour-long documentary *The Machine* won the Best Pitch Award, ASD Award, and Far East Transvideo x CCDF Award at the 2016 CNEX Chinese Doc Forum. The film debuted on Knowledge Network (B.C, Canada) and Discovery Asia. He is working on his debut feature film.

ZHANG Hong-jie / 60 min / 2021

Same-sex Marriage, Human Rights

CHI Chia-wei used to give away condoms during the 80s while dressing as Snow White, Jesus or the mummy. His activism received attention from the media and suffered discrimination from the general public. As a volunteer striving to make more people understand AIDS, he organized a press conference at which he came out, becoming the first person in Taiwan to do it. In 2017, a constitutional ruling made him a hero in the gay community. A 30-year struggle seemed to reach its final destination or a new starting point?



DIRECTOR ZHANG Hong-jie

ZHANG Hong-jie is an independent documentary filmmaker, who uses a camera to observe and record social issues. His documentaries mainly focus on portraits, such as baseball players, ex-offenders, indigenous people and puppet opera performers. To ZHANG, shooting a documentary is his way to explore the world and communicate with society; making a documentary is his calling.

Family, Politics, History, Investigative

This is a film about searching and losing. Two threads intertwine and form the whole of the story. One of which is about my husband, a man from a JI family. He could be a descendent of the Pingpu tribe, but neither he nor his family remembers their origin.

The other is about the tragedy in which Xiaoling Village, one of the few places in Taiwan comprehensively preserving Pingpu culture, was destroyed overnight during the Typhoon Morakot disaster.

We try to extend the time and observe the rising and falling of life and the cycle of nature, so that we can walk out of sadness and realize the ever-changing nature and wisdom of life.



Reel Taiwan: Selected Films from Fragrant Formosa

1970s – 80s

Shot on 16mm film, the Taiwanese documentary television series *Fragrant Formosa* consists of 34 episodes; the first season was aired on Taiwan's China Television Company (CTV) in 1975, and the second season at the end of 1980. They are considered important Taiwanese “local documentaries” for their historical and cultural values.

Thanks to the continued efforts of the Taiwan Film and Audiovisual Institute (TFAI), the series has re-emerged in digitised form after years of silence, with some of the episodes fully restored. In this programme, we select nine episodes featuring Taiwanese local traditions, folk cultures, indigenous communities, and common people's occupations, offering the viewer a glimpse at the norms and values of Taiwanese mainstream society of a bygone era.

Indigenous with a Capital “I”: Indigenous Documentaries from 1994 to 2000

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The English title of this programme, *Indigenous with a Capital “I”*, is indebted to the late Māori director Barry BARCLAY, who first introduced the concept of “Fourth Cinema” in the 1980s to promote two iconic ideas: Indigenous stories in films should be interpreted by indigenous people; the indigenous “interiority” should be recognised and highlighted as a creative force.

Owing to fast-developing technologies and wider availability of affordable equipment, the 1990s saw an explosion in Taiwanese documentary filmmaking. That’s when indigenous filmmakers picked up their cameras to tell authentic stories of their own communities.

As Life, As Pangcah (1998) by Mayaw Biho

This programme selects 17 films produced between 1994 and 2000 by indigenous filmmakers who studied in film academies, worked as journalists, or attended local training camps on cultural/historical documentary filmmaking. We intend to explore these early productions in terms of their central issues, viewpoints, aesthetics, and formation of discourses.

Productions from this era may be regarded as the first wave of indigenous cinema in Taiwan; they preserve invaluable historical records that inform our understanding of Taiwanese society today.
